

PRINT INDEXES

A guide to the major print indexes held at Moore College

February 2007

- The indexes to the literature described below are shelved, with the exception of *Elenchus Bibliographica*, in alphabetical order in the waist high shelves in the Serials Room. Each annual volume has to be searched individually.
- While the indexes are in English, Latin, German and French respectively, do not be deterred by this as with a little practice you will be able to navigate around the subject arrangement and the author and other listings. Biblical references are usually arranged in canonical order. Often the citations for books in English are given in English.
- These indexes index a different range of journals to that indexed by ATLA and other databases so that you will be widen your coverage of the literature by including them in your search strategy.
- If you are looking for a more subject specific index or and bibliography, browse the catalogue or the Reference Collection which is located on the top floor of the Library.

Australasian Religion Index

ARI is an author, subject and scriptural passage index to over eighty religious and theological serials published in Australia or New Zealand and representing all religious traditions. Related areas of study such as history and sociology are also covered. Articles are arranged by author and there is a subject index. The Reviews section is arranged by the author of the work being reviewed. This publication is produced by members of ANZTLA (of which MCL is an active member.)

Elenchus of Biblica – described as the “Rolls Royce of indexes”

Elenchus of Biblica is a bibliography of literature about the Bible and related topics that covers doctoral dissertations, as well as periodical and monographic literature. The *Elenchus* is published in Rome and indexes titles found in the libraries of the Pontifical Biblical Institute, the Pontifical Gregorian University and the University of Leiden. Citations are arranged by subject with Author (Auctorum), Place (Situs), Word (Voces) and Bible reference (Sacra Scriptura) indexes are located at the back of each volume. While it is the most extensive bibliography for Biblical studies, it is usually several years behind in its coverage of literature. As at 9-1-07, the 2002 volume published in 2005 is the latest volume that we hold.

Internationale Zeitschriftenschau fur Bibelwissenschaft und Grenzgebiete (International Review of Biblical Studies)

The citations are arranged by subject and include an abstract. A guide to the subject layout is provided at the back of the volume as is an author index. A list of abbreviations of the journal titles indexed is given at the front of each volume.

- **The following index is shelved in the Serials Room as part of the *Theologicae Lovanienses* journal.**

Elenchus Bibliographicus

This bibliography is published as fascicule 2/3 of each year's issue of the journal *Ephemerides Theologicae Lovanienses*. The bibliography is a listing of books and articles which appeared during the preceding year and covers the subject fields of theology and canon law: history of theology, history of religions, Old and New Testament, fundamental and dogmatic theology, sacramentology and liturgy, moral and pastoral theology, and canon law. The volume starts with an outline of the subject arrangement and finishes with an author index. The Library is arranging for a trial of the electronic version of the bibliography and journal.

Books

1. Search the Moore Catalogue as we are fortunate to have a great library.
2. Search Sydney University to read the book or photocopy there
3. Request document delivery/interlibrary loan – <http://www.library.moore.edu.au/libpostgrads/>

However, not all material retrieved from citations in databases is available.

Journals

1. May find fulltext on ATLA
2. Search the Moore Catalogue by journal title.
3. Search *ATLA* or *Religion and Philosophy Collection* Databases to see if the article is in fulltext there
4. Search AULOTS <http://www.library.moore.edu.au/libaulotsif/> or in the Serials Room to see if the journal is held in a library in Sydney
5. Request document delivery/interlibrary loan <http://www.library.moore.edu.au/libpostgrads/>
